





- Silver accreditation?





Work with Ukrainian community in Adur & Worthing

What's going on? Why are we talking about Ukraine today?

- According to the World Bank estimate, in 2021, 43.8 million people lived in Ukraine
- As of June 2023, **8 million 177** thousand Ukrainians were abroad.
- 85% are women with children
- **3.7 million** remain **displaced persons in Ukraine**, reports the UN International Organization for Migration.
- **210,300** Ukrainian people **in the UK** by July 2024 using one of the two bespoke entry visa schemes.
- Employed or self-employed 69%; Receiving public benefits 40%; Households with dependent children-40%



The Ukrainian Survey and Report

- Purpose to **better understand this community's needs**, we undertook a Survey between July and August of 2024.
- The purpose of the survey is to obtain data from adult Ukrainians living locally on the topic of:
- housing issues,
- employability,
- general questions,
- visa issues,
- integration of children.
- Data collection method: Data was obtained through a questionnaire in a Google form, anonymous. Number of respondents: 102

















Sussex VCSE Leaders Alliance

- Recruited and appointed an Independent Chair.
- Further developed the Sussex VCSE Leaders Alliance ('SVLA'), successfully submitting a proposal for NHS funding to:
 - Establish a new executive SVLA Team of 4 Strategic Leads across Sussex, hosted by Community Works, Community People in West Sussex and East Sussex Community Voice)
 - Enable the VCSE 'Strategic Voice' within the Integrated Care System, ensuring that VCSE Representatives help to shape key areas of work, such as the development of Integrated Community Teams.
 - o Identify opportunities for greater collaboration between the VCSE Sector and Health and Care Partners across Sussex.







Looking ahead...prioritising:

- Completing the review and update of our new strategic plan for the organisation
- Supporting the organisation as we continue to navigate and operate in a challenging financial context
- Build on our Climate Action work
- Continuation and development of the commitment across the organisation to improve our diversity and inclusion work and create more inclusive and safe working spaces
- Development work related to increasing VCSE leadership engagement with changing NHS structures locally and across Sussex
- Continuing to identify new areas of delivery based on needs of our partners and members

Our new Key Messages

Key Messages, crafted by our members at last year's AGM to capture the VCSE's critical skills, resources, and value in shaping policy and decisions:

- 1. The VCSE is a valuable partner to the statutory sector. Involving us in strategic decision-making and co-design, as well as service delivery, is more efficient and impactful
- 2. Collaborating with the VCSE helps to <u>prevent problems and improve the wellbeing and safety of people and communities</u>. Loss of the sector undermines the local offer
- 3. Partnering with the VCSE helps to <u>achieve equity and inclusion</u>, by addressing barriers for underserved communities and facilitating greater involvement
- 4. The VCSE can help statutory partners to access resources, including funding and volunteers
